March meeting: This months meeting was called to order by Vice President, Dottie Rogers, filling in for George Kahl who was ill.

Various upcoming topics were discussed such as the plant sale, bus trip, plant pricing, Hope Center, memorials, vard visits and plant exchange.

Eunice Weber gave a presentation of her passion, "Daylilies". Ancient Egyptians, used them for food, in 1554 they were introduced to the Netherlands, spread through Europe and the settlers brought the daylilies to North America.

Using a handout, Eunice discussed propagation, the different petal edges (ruffled) hybridizing, internal flower parts as well as the names of various other parts of the daylily, and how they are classified: dormant, semievergreen and evergreen.

One notable fact is that there are only two colors that you will not find the petals to be solid in color: blue and white.

Slides were shown to show shapes, sizes, colors, color variations and petal edges. Well presented presentation with slides. Eunice's daughter, Lisa Weber ran the slide projector. Historian,, Jerry Linker
