Carol will be sharing her top 10 favorite orchids. Growing orchids in our homes has become widely popular, and although perceived as exotic, most are inexpensive and easy to care for by following a few simple rules. Carol will be sharing these rules.

February meeting: Emily Ehley was our speaker. She works for Trees Forever. She has worked on projects in Alton and Granite City. There are grants available for the planting of trees. Emily's talk was about Spring ephemerals. Ephemerals are short lived. They bloom, produce seed and whither away. They take advantage of the sunlight before the tree leaves form a canopy of shade. Another new word is myrmecochory, seeds that are dispersed by ants. They get deposited about 2 meters, not far when transported by ants. Emily shared pictures of many ephemerals. Shooting star, Dutchman's breeches, hepatica, wild ginger, trout lily, woodland phlox, May apple, trilliums, wild geranium, and bloodroot. It was fun to hear Helen and Barb's story of using the bloodroot juice as nail polish, when they were young girls.
