July garden meeting: Our July 21st meeting found us on a warm evening at Theodora Farm on Alby Street. They graciously had some cold flavored water (Basil & Cucumber?) and cookies set out for us, which was greatly appreciated. Along with several of our members, I have been purchasing organic vegetable from the farm the last several years. Kris Larson has been the farm manger since they opened about 3 years go. Kris came to the Alton area to manage the community garden at La Vista Park a number of years ago. He and his wife then began selling organically grown vegetable from their own place until he was approached about running Theodora Farm. He has an extensive background in organic faming as well as a Mater's Degree in Business. He told us about rotating the crops, weed control (mostly manual), managing year round employees, figuring out what will and won't sell in the various markets that they frequent, how they handle their garden waste (plowed under), row cover as well as sun cover and talked about future plans for the farm. Like any seasoned gardener, he said he's always reminding his employees that they aren't just harvesting produce, but that they are constantly building the soil. He said there are a couple of products that they are allowed to use on the crops for pest control that still allow it to be considered an organic farm.

This year, customers were given the opportunity to purchase shares in a community supported garden plan. They are hoping to have some youth gardening projects there in the future. He said the farm house is used for various meetings and also used as a bake shop for some of the products sold in the farm store. He graciously kept the farm store open for us before the meeting started. I took advantage and purchased a loaf of their polenta sourdough bread, some oyster mushrooms and a bag of fresh mixed lettuce! Fabulous! They also sell a variety of jams, honey, organic meats, a wide array of vegetables, t-shirts, baked goods, herbs and chocolates, to name a few items.

Kris was very kind and answered many questions. It was quite refreshing to hear someone speak so passionately about their life's work. Do yourself a favor and drop by this local organic farm and help support neighboring businesses!

We then adjourned our meeting down the road to Pearson' Ice Cream stand where the club treated everyone to a nice cold dessert. Lovely finish to a hot day!. *Paula Zugmaier*
